ITEM 1: Introductions and Approve Agenda

Action: The agenda was approved as written. No objections.

ITEM 2: Draft Action Notes from the October 24, 2012 MAG Meeting

Action: The action notes for the 10/24/2012 MAG Meeting were approved as final. No objections.

ITEM 3: Update: Northwest Power & Conservation Council's (NPCC) Decision and

Recommendations to Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) on Data Management Projects reviewed by Program Evaluation & Reporting Committee (PERC)

Tom Iverson provided an overview of the <u>NPCC's Decision and Recommendations to BPA on Data Management Projects reviewed by PERC.</u>

The NPCC approved continued funding for PNAMP and StreamNet with 10-15% funding reductions to the projects. They redefined StreamNet's priority work to servicing data collected by projects funded by BPA and away from general fish information in the basin. PNAMP's budget reductions were directed to more efficient subcontracting for their web service work.

In addition, the NPCC recommended to BPA to continue to support the Fish Screening Oversight Committee quarterly meetings, workshops, training sessions, and web-based

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products. Although the NPCC recommended the continuation of the FSOC activities the future of FSOC remains unclear as there has been no indication whether funds will be provide to implement the actions. The fish and wildlife managers were encouraged to contact the NPCC and BPA to express the importance of continued funding for the FSOC services and activities.

The final decision on the Regional HEP Team project has been deferred until the Wildlife Crediting Forum provides a final recommendation. The NHI project will be discontinued and the data will be transferred to StreamNet.

The SOTR report will be discontinued and a scope of work for technical services is being developed by a Council and BPA staff steering committee to cover any resulting data and reporting gaps as outlined in the draft <u>PERC technical services work plan</u>. Discussions are ongoing to define scope of work and cost. They have identified the need for Neil Ward and Binh Quan to assist in the effort to shift the data over to a NPCC product.

The Wildlife Managers are supporting the Regional HEP Team's work by developing a 2-year funding recommendation that is out for review, and scheduled to go to the NPCC at the end of December 2012. The recommendation identifies a need for the Regional HEP Team effort and a request for funding support on 2-year increments to reevaluate priority work.

The Coordinated Assessments facilitation was not identified in the PERC recommendations and is currently unfunded. BPA, NPCC, and NOAA are discussing the continuation of the Coordination Assessments Project and its funding through a technical service contract. Tom Iverson has been identified to facilitate some of that work. The fish and wildlife managers were encouraged to contact the NPCC and BPA to express the importance of continued funding for the services and activities associated with the Coordinated Assessment project.

The FY12 CBFWA contract ends March 31, 2013. The FY13 CBFWA contract renewal is due for submittal next week to BPA. Tom I. notified BPA, that our contract will be submitted late. It is likely that all the discussions and negotiations won't be resolved until the end of January 2013. At this time CBFWF Staff's employment is uncertain because funding levels are unknown.

In conclusion, the fish and wildlife managers need to contact NPCC and BPA staff and discuss regional coordination facilitation needs for the upcoming year(s). Calls to Tony Grover and Bill Maslen will affect the level of support for continuing important technical forums that support the Fish and Wildlife Program.

ITEM 4: CBFWA/F FY2013 Work Plan and Budget

Members' Status

- Burns Paiute Tribe Formal Notice to Withdrawal

Discussion:

The Burns Paiute Tribe and Shoshone Paiute Tribe submitted their formal notices and resolution to withdrawal from the CBFWA organization, effective 3/31/2013. Tom I. stated that there may be more Members planning to withdrawal from the organization.

Potential Work Plan Elements for FY13

Discussion:

Tom Iverson provided an overview of the draft <u>FY13 Activities and Options for CBFWA Future</u> to the MAG to assist in the discussion of the FY 2013 CBFWA work plan, budget, potential regional activities and products, and membership options and funding levels.

The FY 2013 regional coordination activities will likely focus on data management, data sharing and reporting related to the Program Amendment process and the BiOp remand process.

The most pressing issues for the MAG and Policy Representatives are for each Member to define their commitment to retain CBFWA membership and provide funding for staff and

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the organization. Do the Members want to maintain their membership? Staff is seeking work outside the organization to arrange gainful employment by April 1, 2013. The fish and wildlife managers need to identify and request what services they may need performed by staff ASAP.

The options presented are 1) Status quo; 2) Maintain CBFWA charter via membership dues, without dedicated staff, and activate when needed; and 3) Eliminate CBFWA and continue the CBFWF as a non-profit consulting contracting agency. All these options are feasible. Time is running out, it is important that the Members make a decision on their funding level and membership commitment. The Staff is searching for work. Potential contracts currently being discussed are technical services to Council and BPA staff defined by NPCC's PERC, facilitation for the Fish Screen Oversight Committee, facilitation for Coordinated Assessments, and helping coordinate an Accord status and trends reports for the Yakama Nation.

Following today's interactive discussion, the Members Advisory Group will go back and meet with their policy representatives to discuss the three Membership options and potential funding contributions. The MAG will meet on January 8th to discuss their individual decisions regarding membership status and funding level commitments for staff and the organization.

Discussion:

Tom I. stated that the CRT review process is moving along to their phase 2 analysis. They are narrowing their alternatives and conducting detailed analyses to prepare a recommendation for public review and submission to the state department.

Mark Bagdovitz added that 2013 will be a busy year for the CRT review process. The public sessions are scheduled for summer 2013. They plan to submit the recommendation to the state department by December 2013 to give the state department enough time to make the national determination on the treaty in 2014. September 2014 is the last time to issue a termination notice for action in 2024. Anything past that date would extend the treaty another year.
