A quorum was not present as Idaho Department of Fish and Game (IDFG) and **Action:**

Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks (MDFWP) were not in

attendance. The Members agreed that they would proceed with the understanding that Brian Lipscomb would contact IDFG and/or MDFWP to discuss and review

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actions and gain approval.

Initially, the Members agreed that they would abbreviate the agenda; however, by

meeting's end, all items were discussed.

Update: Brian Lipscomb discussed the Members actions with Larry Peterman, MDFWP, on

August 1st and received concurrence.

ITEM 3: Status Report from Northwest Power and Conservation Council (NPCC) Fish

& Wildlife Committee Chair and/or Members

Amendment Process Timeline: Rhonda Whiting stated that Tony Grover, NPCC

F&W Director, has made recommendations, and the NPCC has received

recommendations regarding an alternate timeline, but to date the NPCC has not

formally adopted a date to begin the amendment process.

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> Science Policy Conference: Rhonda stated that the NPCC is moving ahead on the Science Policy Conference scheduled for September 12-13 in Portland.

> "Consultation" Panel Discussions: Addressing the concern about the use of the term "consultation" in reference to the panel discussions planned at the NPCC monthly meetings, Rhonda explained that in the context of the panel discussions, "consultation" falls under the definition in Section 4(h)(5) of the Northwest Power Act, which is different than the Executive Order referring to federal agencies and tribes meeting on formal consultations regarding tribal government.

Coordination Funding: Rhonda stated that NPCC is looking forward to the Coordination group's presentation at the September NPCC meeting to provide their feedback toward defining the tasks categorized as coordination.

Joan Dukes added that she appreciates the work that CBFWA Members are doing assisting in the amendment process and she looks forward to the August NPCC panel discussion in Spokane WA.

ITEM 4: Approve Draft (Version 6) CBFWA Comments on Corps of Engineers (Corps) Plan for Addressing Pacific Lamprey Passage, Draft, 2007-2011

Dave Ward advised that all comments received were incorporated into the comment letter and attachment, as well as suggestions received from the Members Advisory Group (MAG) at their July 17th meeting.

The Members approved the draft, version 6, comment letter and attachment, to the **Action:** Corps of Engineers. No objections.

ITEM 5: July 24-25, 2007 Amendments Workshop Report

Brian advised that the workshop in Spokane was well attended and produced successful in-depth direction, discussion, and strategies. The Resident Fish Advisory Committee (RFAC) and Anadromous Fish Advisory Committee (AFAC) presented their deliberations regarding the linkages at the local level between objectives, limiting factors and threats, measures, and strategies.

The Wildlife Advisory Committee (WAC) has identified a strategy to identify and clarify biological objectives in the form of ecological restoration at the subbasin levels, which include conservation strategy actions and subbasin planning actions linked to habitat acquisition strategies currently in the program. From there, the WAC will develop a reporting mechanism relative to the implementation strategy timeline and build M&E protocols to assess the success of acquiring and restoring habitat.

The WAC has posted three white papers for review (see link above) explaining in detail the WAC's focus. Also posted is a comprehensive presentation with examples of how objectives roll-up with regard to fish.

Brian stated that the conclusion of this work brings the technical committees and the MAG near completion of the first major step of the process as called for in the Members' actions at the February 2007 Members meeting.

The MAG has asked the technical committees to provide some advice on what it would take to assess losses for resident fish across the Federal Columbia River Power System (FCRPS), and from an anadromous fish perspective, linking limitations to the current loss statements and exploring alternatives to articulate

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obligations linked to the FCRPS through the development and clarification of limiting factors, (i.e., at the mainstem level).

A workshop is scheduled in Polson on September 17, 2007 to finalize all of this information into a final product for recommendation to the Members at the meeting in Polson on September 18-19th.

ITEM 6: Outcomes to Report to NPCC

Brian reviewed a draft presentation prepared by CBFWA staff for the NPCC August meeting and requested Member feedback. The Members agreed that details should be minimal with emphasis on the positive progress made establishing the foundation for amendment recommendations and advising that CBFWA Members expect to be well positioned to seek consensus on recommendations.

The Members agreed that this high profile topic should be represented directly by Members. Vice-chair, Larry Peterman, MDFWP, will be asked to provide the presentation as Dan Diggs, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), will not be available. CBFWA Members from the Upper Columbia River Tribes (UCUT) will be invited to attend to provide support and feedback.

The Members moved to ask Brian Lipscomb to follow-up with the Vice-chair and with CBFWA Members of the UCUT, to inquire about availability and willingness to deliver the presentation. No objections.

Brian Lipscomb emailed the draft CBFWA Program Amendments presentation to Members on Friday, August 3rd. Brian advised that Vice-chair, Larry Peterman, MDFWP, will deliver the presentation to the NPCC with support from Nate Pamplin, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), and Joe Peone from the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation (CTCR). Brian advised that additional CBFWA Member participation is welcome and would be appreciated. ITEM 7: Data Management Summit

Dan Diggs advised that a Data Management Summit is planned for October 2007 with various entities sponsoring the summit including Pacific Northwest Aquatic Monitoring Partnership (PNAMP) and Northwest Environmental Data Network (NED). Dan stated that Rob Walton, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), had planned to attend to discuss participation with the Members; however, Rob was not available.

Dan advised that he had a prior discussion in which Rob referenced an approach toward a positive outcome with the key element of how the Collaborative Systemwide Monitoring and Evaluation Project (CSMEP) would fit into the regional data management picture.

Brian Lipscomb added that he and Rob discussed a request from NOAA for CBFWA's assistance to develop an agenda with focus on high level reporting (i.e., Status of the Resource [SOTR], Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board [OWEB], and State of the Salmon).

Brian advised that Rob Walton is scheduled to attend the August 21st MAG meeting and the September 5th Members teleconference to discuss this topic.

Tom Iverson added that the focus of the data management summit is to obtain executive input. Tom posed the question, "who of our Members would like to provide design and feedback with regard to planning material for the meeting?" Tom emphasized that tribal representation is needed.

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Update:

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Dan Diggs stated that USFWS will participate, Joe Peone, CTCR, stated that he may be willing to participate. Nate Pamplin, WDFW, stated that he would confirm whether Bruce Crawford, WDFW, would participate.

ITEM 8: CBFWA Office Move Update

Brian Lipscomb advised that CBFWA is proceeding forward with finalizing plans to move to the third floor. The 3rd floor space will accommodate the Fish Passage Center (FPC) in the event that CBFWA obtains that contract; however, no move plans will be finalized for the FPC until a contract decision is made. Brian stated that CBFWA is expected to move the middle to third week of September 2007.

ITEM 9: Personnel Update

Brian Lipscomb shared that when recruiting for the Systems and Data Manager vacancy, CBFWA staff experienced a delay using the traditional natural resource vacancy recruitment process; however, Jann Eckman regrouped and released the announcement into the mainstream market resulting in a favorable response.

CBFWA staff Dave Ward, Neil Ward, and Jann Eckman participated in the interview process and agreed upon a final candidate. The candidate's qualifications were presented to the MAG in an emergency teleconference on July 27th and in that meeting, the MAG gave approval to offer the position to the candidate, Binh Quan.

Brian announced that Binh Quan accepted the offer and will start with CBFWA on Monday, August 6th. Binh has excellent qualifications in both web design and systems administration. In addition, Binh had a brief experience working with the Corps of Engineers, enjoyed the subject matter of the Columbia, and was excited to have an opportunity to work in the fish and wildlife arena.
